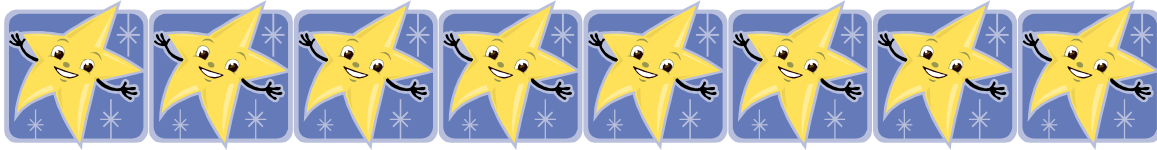

HOW COLD IS TOO COLD TO ALLOW STUDENTS TO PLAY OUTDOORS?

During typical winter days, common sense requires us to look beyond a specific temperature and consider factors such as wind chill, whether or not the sun is shining, how well the children are prepared to play outdoors (jackets, gloves, and hats), what activity the children are participating in, and the length of time to be spent outside. I do want to remind everyone that it is the intention of the school to hold recess during cold spells. To that end I encourage all of you to adequately prepare your child to play outdoors (jackets, gloves, and hats). With respect to morning recess, which is often held during the coldest part of the day, I will go outside in the morning at around 8:15am to access the conditions. In addition I will consult my trusty UMASS Amherst Computer Science Weather Station weblink. We will then make an informed decision as to whether we have inside or outside recess.

COACHES' CORNER

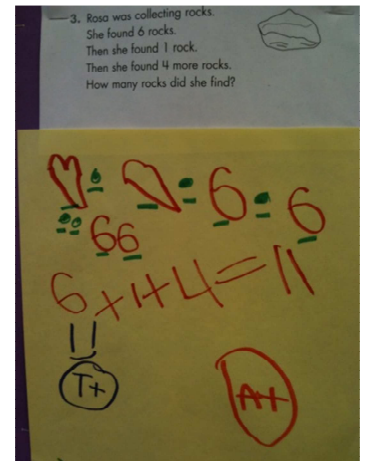
In the last Crocker Chronicles, Stephanie Joyce shared literacy news with you. In this Coaches' Corner, I will share math news from our school.

MATH PUZZLES – Izzy Clark and Kai Harwood have been working on creating a way to get students excited about doing mathematical puzzles. As 6th graders, they worked on Zupelz (number puzzles similar to Sudoku) and wanted to share their enthusiasm with others in the Crocker Farm Community. They have created a bulletin board outside of Room 32 that displays the weekly puzzle and asks for solutions. Both Izzy and Kai will collect solutions and share data on the number of students who complete them. They are beginning in the upper grades, and hope to move to the primary grades in the coming weeks.

STORY PROBLEMS – In the primary grades, students are beginning to work with Story Problems. They are applying what they know about how numbers go together (addition and subtraction) to real life situations. Not only is it important for students to be able to compute numbers, but they also need to interpret what a problem is asking for them to do with those numbers. Do I take away? Do I find the difference? Am I putting numbers together? Here are some examples of student work:



FIRST IN MATH – www.firstinmath.com - Your children have had access to the First in



Math website since the fall. Many students have reported spending time at home working in the Number Gyms to practice facts and unlocking new bonus games. Teachers have provided time for students to log on in class during enhancement block and at other times

during the day. Students have also logged on during their technology block with Ms. Breen. This is a great way for students to practice math skills! If you need help accessing the internet to log on, please feel free to ask for help from me, Ms. Breen or Ms. Tara Luce. We'd be glad to help you. If your student needs his/her username and password again, classroom teachers, Ms. Breen and I have a record.

Dear Parents and Guardians of Crocker Farm children,
Attached, you will find a copy of the 2012 Crocker Farm Directory database. The PGO Executive Board has decided not to print this database as a document because only 97 families responded to our many pleas for updated information. The cost of printing a copy of the directory for each family is close to \$400. Since so few families updated/submitted information, we felt it would be better to spend those \$400 elsewhere.

I can tell you, from personal experience, that when I tried to invite twelve people to my son's birthday party, I was only able to find information for four of the twelve people in the attached database.

Next year, in order to avoid an incomplete directory, we will ask families to opt out of the directory, by check marking a box on a form that will arrive home with the initial "Welcome Back" school packet. Hopefully we will get enough people to make a hard copy run of a comprehensive directory for 2012-2013.
